Owen M. Beitsch has been with RERC since 1990. Prior to joining the firm, he had been a principal with the real estate consulting practice of Laventhol and Horwath, one of the original *Big Eight* accounting partnerships. Owen began his professional career as the Director of Planning for the Tennessee Housing Development Agency, at that time one of the largest housing finance agencies in the country.
